This year, a process to reach out strategically to each of the 14 NYS schools on our AMTA mailing list was developed.

To promote the essay contest, we mailed a flyer and an introduction/ description letter to each school in 4 separate phases. We designed each packet to be received within a few weeks of the prior envelope to ensure that the schools and students would receive regular reminders of the contest. In addition to physical copies, we sent e-blasts to the schools and posted on the AMTA-NY webpage.

Once all essays were received, the committee reviewed each one anonymously. They were organized and ranked, each essay by a designated letter to eliminate discrimination of any kind. # **Legislative Update**

## **AMTA-NY New York State Budget**

The State Legislature introduced and passed the final enacted budget in the first week of May, a month past the April 1st deadline for an ontime budget. The final budget did not include the Governor's proposal to allow out-of-state licensed professional in high-need healthcare professions to apply for a temporary practice permit, as well the proposal to transfer oversight of healthcare professions, including massage therapists, from the State Department of Education (SED), to the Department of Health.

### Legislation

AMTA-NY continues to track all proposed legislation potentially affecting the massage therapy profession, and partners with an experienced New York State government affairs firm to strategically engage stakeholders when appropriate. AMTA-NY has had a New York State based government affairs engaged on our behalf for over 20 years.

This year, Assemblymember Pat Fahy was named the new Chair of the Assembly Higher Education Committee, the committee through which a majority of legislation affecting the massage therapy profession is considered. Our contracted lobbyists met with the Assemblymember's office to educate the new chair and her staff on our profession, the issues we face including harmful legislation referred to the Higher Education Committee, and to ensure our association is a trusted partner as they navigate issues of the 55 SED licensed professions.

AMTA-NY's interests were also brought to the long-standing Chair of the Senate's Higher Education Committee, Senator Stavisky, and various new members of the committees.

The 2023 Legislative Session concludes on June 9, at which point all legislation not passed by both Houses will be recommitted to their committees of reference, and will not have the opportunity to be taken up until the Legislature returns in January 2024.

Below is a non-exhaustive list of the legislation AMTA-NY is currently tracking. AMTA-NY engages in legislation when and in a manner that is respectful and appropriate. As most legislation is not given the opportunity to advance, action is not required on all bills of concern.

S.5787/A.1112 – This legislation, which AMTA-NY strongly opposes, would decriminalize unauthorized practice of massage therapy.

At this time, the bill has not advanced from committee in either House, nor is it scheduled to. AMTA-NY has been in contact with the appropriate stakeholders since the bill's original introduction in 2021, who are aware of the Association's opposition.

A.1769 – Requires non-pharmaceutical alternative treatment options to be covered by the medical assistant program and by private health insurers.

This legislation has been introduced since 2018, but has not advanced from the Assembly Committee on Insurance.

A.3405 – Creates a separate license for the practice of reflexology.

This legislation has been reintroduced every legislative cycle since 2017, but has never advanced from its committee of origin, due in part to AMTA-NY's advocacy against the proposal. The bill has not had a Senate sponsor since 2018.

A.4464 – Provides that where mandatory continuing education programs are offered through electronic or other remote means where the licensee must provide proof of attendance by responding to a visual or auditory prompt in the program, such program shall provide a sufficient length of time for a person with a visual or other impairment to be able to view and respond to such prompt or direction.

This bill does not currently have a Senate sponsor, and has not advanced from its committee of origin.

S.6275/A.6166 – This bill removes the words "masseur" and "masseuse" from the Education Law, in order to ensure "Massage Therapist" is the only title officially recognized by the state. This bill does not allow for unlicensed practice, as "massage therapy" is clearly defined in the Education Law, and any such practice regardless of title used is illegal without proper licensure. Stakeholders including the State Education Department were consulted for technical comments, and raised no concerns regarding unlicensed practice.

AMTA-NY has worked with the bill sponsors and Chair of the Assembly Higher Education Department to ensure any language advance would protect the massage therapy profession.

S.1961/A.6757 – Would require a licensed massage therapist to display his or her license when practicing.

This bill has been introduced for many years and has not advanced from its committee of origin.

S.1191 – Requires certain licensed health care providers, including massage therapists, to disclose to patients their probationary status, the cause for probation, and other details regarding the conditions of a licensee's probationary period.

This bill has not been advanced from the Higher Education

Committee, and currently does not have an Assembly sponsor.

S.2027 – Authorizes district attorneys to intervene in cases in which a landlord seeks to remove a tenant because of illegal activity on the rented premises.

This legislation has been introduced for the past few years and has not advanced from the Housing Committee, and currently does not have an Assembly sponsor.

S.3521/A.1227 – Requires health practitioners to discuss the risks associated with certain pain medications before prescribing them, and to discuss alternative treatments that may be available.

This legislation is referred to the Health Committee and has not advanced. As a reminder, last year AMTA-NY was successful in having legislation signed into law requiring practitioners to consider and prescribe non-opioid treatment alternatives, including massage therapy, for neuromusculoskeletal conditions causing pain. We partnered with the associations representing chiropractic, physical therapy and occupational therapy on this law signed in 2022.

S.5581/A.715 – Authorizes certain licensed health care professionals to form limited liability companies. In permitting such organizational entities to be formed by licensed professionals, it broadens the array of collaborative options available to health care practitioners looking to offer multidisciplinary services.

Both the Senate and Assembly bills remain in their committees of origin.

S.6202/A.658 – Enacts the Health Care Nondiscrimination Act of 2023 and provides that there should be pay equity for certain title 8 professions, including massage therapy, by health insurance plans or health benefits.

This legislation is in the Assembly Insurance Committee and the Senate Health Committee. There are a number of technical issues with this particular bill including most of the sections being pre-empted by federal law.

S.6651 – Would amend the Workers' Compensation Law to add licensed massage therapists to the list of authorized providers of workers' compensation.

This legislation has long been supported by AMTA-NY, however, due to objections from the Workers' Compensation Board, both Governor Cuomo and Governor Hochul chose to veto the bill after it passed both Houses in separate years. The legislation is being advanced through the Senate Labor Committee.

### **NYSHIP Update**

Education Department.

The New York State Health Insurance Program for State and Local Government employees has issued updated information regarding their coverage of massage therapy. AMTA-NY has sought out additional information regarding the plan offerings:

On July 1, 2023 there will be changes to Empire Plan benefits. One of these changes will be the application of an annual 20-visit limit for massage therapy regardless of the provider type who bills the service. This could include services rendered by a massage therapist on an out-of-network basis, a physical therapist, or a chiropractor.

The requirement for a licensed massage therapist to render care to an Empire Plan enrollee is that the enrollee must present a script from their medical provider that includes a specific medical diagnosis.

The Empire Plan does not maintain a network of participating massage therapy providers.
